Letter from the Global Convenor & General Secretary

As we look back on 2025, we want to take a moment to celebrate what we have achieved together and to look ahead with renewed determination, energy and hope.

The year was extraordinary for our movement. In a world facing intersecting crises, we demonstrated the power of a resilient movement that is grounded in grassroots leadership and realities, and capable of bridging local struggles with global influence. From powerful #RedLineToBillionaires actions in January to inspiring People's Assemblies across the South showcasing national demands, we showed what is possible when the 99% unite against inequality. Our 10-Year Roadmap felt ambitious when we launched it in 2023. Your support and partnership inspires hope of turning our hopes for an equal world into reality.

The Global Assembly and We The 99% People's Summit in Johannesburg in November were defining moments. While elite leaders discussed trade disputes at the G20 meetings in the city, the People's Summit captured the narrative. Fight Inequality Alliance (FIA) and partners solidified a Global South-led unity that the official G20 process lacked. With 19 national People's Assemblies shaping a truly global vision of an equitable world, the diversity and power was undeniable.

These moments reflect the emergence of a Global South-led movement - to meet this moment where the global economy and its rules are being reshaped - that is organised, strategic and sustained. Through challenging elite spaces, shaping policy conversations and consolidating our shared agenda, 2025 showed that FIA and allies are building a coherent global force.

The leadership and strategic drive coming from an increasing number of national alliances stepping forward with confidence and sharp political analysis is proof that we are building something bigger than any one of us. FIA's role - between spontaneous protest movements which while powerful may lack sustained structure, and traditional advocacy which may be disconnected from grassroots realities - FIA combines organised constituencies, political education and infrastructure with the ability to mobilise, influence and sustain pressure over time.

The power of broad-based collectives was clear in national campaigns across our alliances from People's Assemblies demanding accountability from elected representatives, to a push for public healthcare in Zimbabwe that forced an increase in supplies to the largest public hospital, to the setting of a minimum support price for wheat farmers in Pakistan. These are real, tangible improvements to people's lives. These are the basis of the movement driving changes to the economic system creating such grotesque inequalities.

Across continents, FIA members and movement organised, mobilised and amplified voices to challenge the 1%. From January’s actions to November’s successes, every assembly, creative protest and call to action has built our collective force. These gains are stepping stones toward a world where the collective power of the 99% outweighs power of the wealthiest 1%. Together, we have shown that movements rooted in grassroots leadership and connected through shared infrastructure become vehicles for systemic transformation.

We know the road ahead will not be easy. The forces driving the inequality crisis are relentless and growing: from billionaire oligarchy and corporate greed, to climate injustice, eroding civic freedoms, rising authoritarianism, and the capture of public institutions by elites. These challenges are real, but so is our resolve. Our growing movement remains the solution to despair: a force that will not only resist but reimagine a world built on justice, dignity, and equality.

We carry this energy forward in 2026. Our actions are bold, creative and sustainable – energising our movement while staying true to our values of care and solidarity. Thank you for being part of this journey - shaping a movement that can challenge inequality, defend rights, and create a just future for all.

DECLARATION

We The 99% – a People’s Summit for Global Economic Justice

We Claim the Future: The 99% Rising for a Just World

We stand here in solidarity as the 99%..., from lands marked by debt and extraction, from communities resisting genocide, patriarchy, and climate chaos. We gather because the world is at a breaking point. Inequality deepens. Illegitimate debt strangles nations. Climate collapse displaces millions. Wars and authoritarianism silence voices.

These crises ... are a deliberate blueprint of a global economic order engineered through conquest, colonialism, and greed, with a racialised and patriarchal system at its core.



TODAY WE DECLARE: ENOUGH.

LIFE MUST COME BEFORE PROFIT.

The moment we are responding to

The triple crisis we face - extreme economic inequality, accelerating climate breakdown, and shrinking democratic space - has a critical impact on the world's most marginalised.

Together, these reinforcing and interconnected crises underscore the urgent need for the collective action that will achieve a more equitable economic system recognising the alternatives envisaged by those affected most. Last year, FIA and all allies demonstrated the power of a broad-based, representative and credible Global South alliance bringing a unique diversity of communities and activists.

Global economic inequality is worsening with billionaire wealth at record highs, while IMF and World Bank austerity programmes contributed to cuts in public services. The richest 1% captured 41% of new global wealth between 2000–2024, while the bottom 50% received just 1%. Rising public debt in the Global South squeezes budgets for education, healthcare, social protection, and climate adaptation.

Shrinking civic space exacerbates inequality and exclusion, with repression more severe in the Global South. Three quarters of the world's population lives in countries where fundamental freedoms of association, peaceful assembly, and expression are heavily restricted or completely non-existent.

Key forums where global economic policies are debated and negotiated – including IMF and World Bank, and elite convenings such as Davos – are shaped by Global North interests and dominant financial sector narratives.



FIA'S ROLE AS LEVER FOR CHANGE

FIA plays a critical role as an organiser, connector, amplifier...

Against this backdrop of exclusion and imbalance, FIA plays a critical role as an organiser, connector, amplifier, and key outside actor shifting priorities of global economic governance. FIA creates a critical outside-in pressure, using global platforms to reclaim the narrative and insert South-led, feminist alternatives into the heart of global decision-making.

In 2025, rising inequality and high-profile policy debates supported broad mobilisation, narrative insertion in elite spaces, and cross-border solidarity. Rising inequality and economic insecurity increased public receptivity to campaigns like #RedLineToBillionaires, supporting FIA's mobilisation across 84 cities in 20 countries. These conditions amplified narratives connecting grassroots experience to systemic critique of neoliberalism.

The need for one representative movement is a refrain we heard repeatedly over the course of the 99% People's Summit. Spearheaded by FIA and supported by a range of partners, we co-created a Johannesburg People's Summit alongside the G20 for a groundswell of activists, workers, youth, economists and social movements from across the Global South to come together to strategise, mobilise and agree a single Declaration reimagining an alternative economic system.

The nature of the triple crises required FIA to balance scaling mobilisation with political risk management. Building broad-based National Councils ensured that the movement's survival does not depend on single individuals. A focus on sustainable operations mitigated devastating impacts of donor funding cuts. Use of digital organisation where physical repression of protests threatened allies also offered protection, such as in Zimbabwe and Kenya.

All these factors increased the relevance of FIA's grassroots organising and equity-focused narratives. This mobilisation formed part of a broader shift in 2025 toward coordinated, sustained movement-building. By linking national struggles to global moments, FIA strengthened its ability to translate grassroots organising into global narrative power and political influence.

In October 2025, activists in Mexico City unfurled a giant banner at the National Palace before marching to the Palace of Mining. Their message to President Claudia Sheinbaum read: "Claudia, we don't expect miracles, we expect a tax on billionaires."



About us

The FIA is a global movement fighting the crisis of inequality to achieve a just, equal and sustainable world. We are a diverse range of movements, organisations, activists and artists demanding change, and working collectively to strengthen the solidarity and power of ordinary people to demand change - and be heard - from local to global level.

Formed in 2016, by 2025 we had over 1,000 member organisations.

FIA's growth has been rapid. Formed in 2016, by 2025 we had over 1,000 member organisations - including community based organisations, NGOs, women's rights groups, social movements and unions - representing millions of people in 50 countries, mostly in the Global South.

Our collective action has already shown results. FIA has contributed to change in policies to reduce inequality and promote social justice, supported grassroots organisations and marginalised communities in their efforts to address inequality, and helped mainstream and shift narratives about issues of inequality.

FIA is growing a global movement, organising and mobilising to counter the excessive concentration of power and wealth in the hands of a small elite. Our fight against inequality is a fight for a just, equal and sustainable world.

How we mobilise

PEOPLE-POWERED MOBILISATION & SOLIDARITY

Driven by activists, grassroots groups and communities; coordinated locally and globally through FIA's national and global teams; and with bold actions and iconic communications that draw thousands into on-the-ground and digital spaces.

CREATING DURABLE MOVEMENT INFRASTRUCTURE

Our infrastructure is prototyped, tested and scaled as FIA's role as coordinator and convenor of a broad-based, South-led movement grows and deepens.

FROM NATIONAL TO GLOBAL COORDINATION

We connect local struggles to global campaigns, ensuring national actions shape a shared agenda.

In 2025, Rise For and We the 99% campaigns increasingly reflected bottom-up planning and global coordination, making mobilisation more strategic and powerful nationally, regionally and across the Global South.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT & EMERGING LEADERSHIP

Catalysts of mobilisation, young people are driving economic justice campaigns, leading as organisers and bringing new ideas.

CREATIVE STORYTELLING & CULTURAL EXPRESSION

We use culturally resonant storytelling to make complex issues visible and actionable.

In 2025, protest theatre in Zambia and India and video montages across Asia and Africa turned abstract issues like debt and tax justice into relatable narratives.

INTEGRATED MOBILISATION, TOOLS AND PARTNERSHIPS

Our mobilisation combines on the ground action with digital amplification, shared tools, and strategic partnerships.

Stronger collaboration with allies in 2025 demonstrated that effective mobilisation relies on both internal systems and a growing external ecosystem.

We rise up for fair taxation, public services, and economic rights — and against extreme wealth concentration, austerity, debt, and elite-driven global systems.

We rise up for accountable governance, people-led decisions, and participatory politics - and against unaccountable elites, corruption, and shrinking civic space.



DEMOCRACY & CIVIC PARTICIPATION

We rise up for accountable governance, citizen-led decisions, and participatory politics - and against unaccountable elites, corruption, and shrinking civic space.



CLIMATE & ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

We rise up for climate equity, sustainability, and Global South-led solutions - and against environmental destruction, climate debt, and inequality-driven ecological harm.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP & EMERGING LEADERS

We rise up for youth-led, on-the-ground protests and intergenerational power - and against exclusion and barriers to young people shaping change.



FEMINISM & JUSTICE FOR WOMEN

We rise up for gender equality, women's rights, and inclusive leadership. We elevate feminist perspectives to address both inequality and the structural gendered injustices that sustain it.

Our strategy

Tackling inequalities requires influencing policies, changing the narratives which drive policies, and shifting the balance of power and voice in any society. It requires changing the system. We drive progressive change through fighting the structural causes of inequality and challenging the power of the 1%.

By challenging existing power structures and building people power, we can counteract the elite capture of our governments, institutions, and ideas. This enables us to create a new window of what is possible, promote alternatives to neoliberalism that disrupt mainstream and institutional narratives.

We are building the will behind this by mobilising strong, people-powered collective action led by local movements, by strengthening grassroots activism, and by bringing diverse groups together to build powerful new alliances across movements, generations and borders.

FROM NATIONAL TO GLOBAL

We recognise that while inequality is driven by common global root causes and systems, it may manifest differently in each country.

We recognise that while inequality is driven by common global root causes and systems, it may manifest differently in each country. For that reason, we build strong national movements that can address the specifics of inequality within each context. National action is primary, and continental and global action reinforce it. This helps to achieve a shift in narrative and changes in policy at both national and global level as well as develop on the ground organising.

The connection of national and regional alliances through the global alliance allows us to build greater collective power, share of resources and global solidarity. Doing this achieves:

- Progressive solutions that tackle inequality gain more credibility and be seen as common-sense norms rather than ‘fringe’ or minority views;
- Decision-makers at national and international level that respond directly to mass public pressure to prioritise fighting inequality; and
- New champions among governments and other power holders, that emerge to engage with citizens and movements, and adopt and show leadership on progressive policies and systemic reforms to tackle economic and power inequalities.

2025 - YEAR OF GEN Z ORGANISING & EMERGING LEADERSHIP

In 2025, Gen Z mobilisation within national alliances saw young people playing active roles in organising, narrative development, digital mobilisation and cultural actions linked to FIA moments. While not driven by a dedicated global strategy, young people meaningfully engaged and contributed across multiple contexts.

This was reflected during the Gen Z session at the People's Summit in South Africa, which brought together young organizers from countries including Nepal, Kenya, the Philippines and Indonesia. The session showcased how Gen Z activists are organising under constrained civic space, reflected on recent youth-led protests that have contributed to major political shifts, and highlighted challenges such as limited resources and decision-making spaces.

For FIA, this signals an important area for development. Young organizers are already shaping public conversations on inequality and power, even without formal structures or recognition. In 2026, there is clear potential to place greater emphasis on youth-led organizing, strengthen political education with younger constituencies, and support pathways for sustained Gen Z leadership within the alliance.

Ten-year roadmap to fight inequality

2025 was a standout year for FIA.

2025 was a standout year for FIA, with significant and wide-spread policy and popular narrative shifts that demonstrate what is possible when the 99% unite against inequality.

We did this by bringing FIA's core strengths: mobilising alongside national alliances, members and allies across the world to create the systemic change we need; shifting agenda-setting power from elites to those most affected by inequality; mobilising thousands across issues and borders, achieving policy wins that improve the lives of hundreds of thousands. All while strengthening durable movement infrastructure.

All actions and achievements are guided by a clear ten-year plan, co-created and approved by FIA members in 2023. Against this, we set and measure annual goals and targets. These work towards our three key objectives for the decade.

THREE KEY OBJECTIVES FOR THE DECADE



Build strong national movements to fight inequality in 60 countries across Asia, Africa, Europe and Latin America and the Caribbean that are connected globally.



Create the most powerful global movement of people against the power of the top 1% in the world yet.

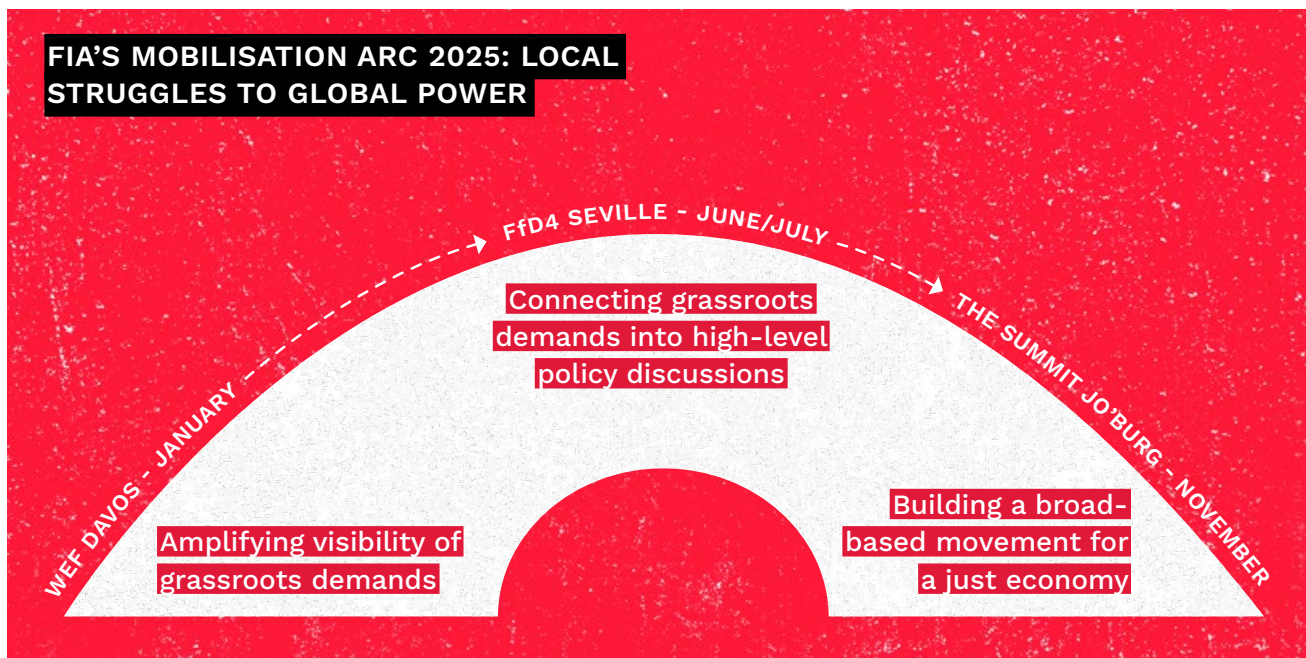


Contribute to changing systems & the introduction of inequality fighting policies by mobilising 50 million people from the grassroots to redefine what happens in the corridors of power across the world.

From visibility to influence: FIA'S breakthrough year

FIA connects local struggles to global power, enabling communities, youth, and alliances to drive coordinated action for systemic change.

In 2025, powerful mobilising across key global moments shifted narratives and contributed to change that made clear the power of coordinated, global mobilisation to drive change.



DAVOS

FIA members drew a bold #RedLineToBillionaires in 14 countries and 48 cities across the global South ahead of the World Economic Forum in Davos, demanding that elites confront the realities faced by the 99%. An iconic, 400-metre projection on the Swiss mountainside - "TAX THE SUPER RICH!" - drove global attention to the urgent need for economic justice. The campaign trended globally and FIA-generated content was amplified by major media outlets, extending the campaign's message far beyond our digital channels. We showed that local communities, united globally, can influence the world's most powerful decision-makers.

SEVILLE

At the Fourth International Conference on Financing for Development in Seville, the FIA movement inserted local demands into high-level policy discussions. Campaigns focused on debt cancellation, progressive taxation and funding for public services. By connecting grassroots mobilisation in countries such as Nepal, Zambia and Pakistan to institutional spaces, FIA ensured that local struggles were reflected in global financial debates.

JO'BURG

FIA spearheaded the We The 99% People's Summit in Johannesburg to bring together thousands of allies from across the Global South, to reimagine an equitable future and co-design strategies to achieve it. The Summit deepened engagement, nurtured new constituencies, and strengthened the alliance's capacity to coordinate and sustain campaigns globally.

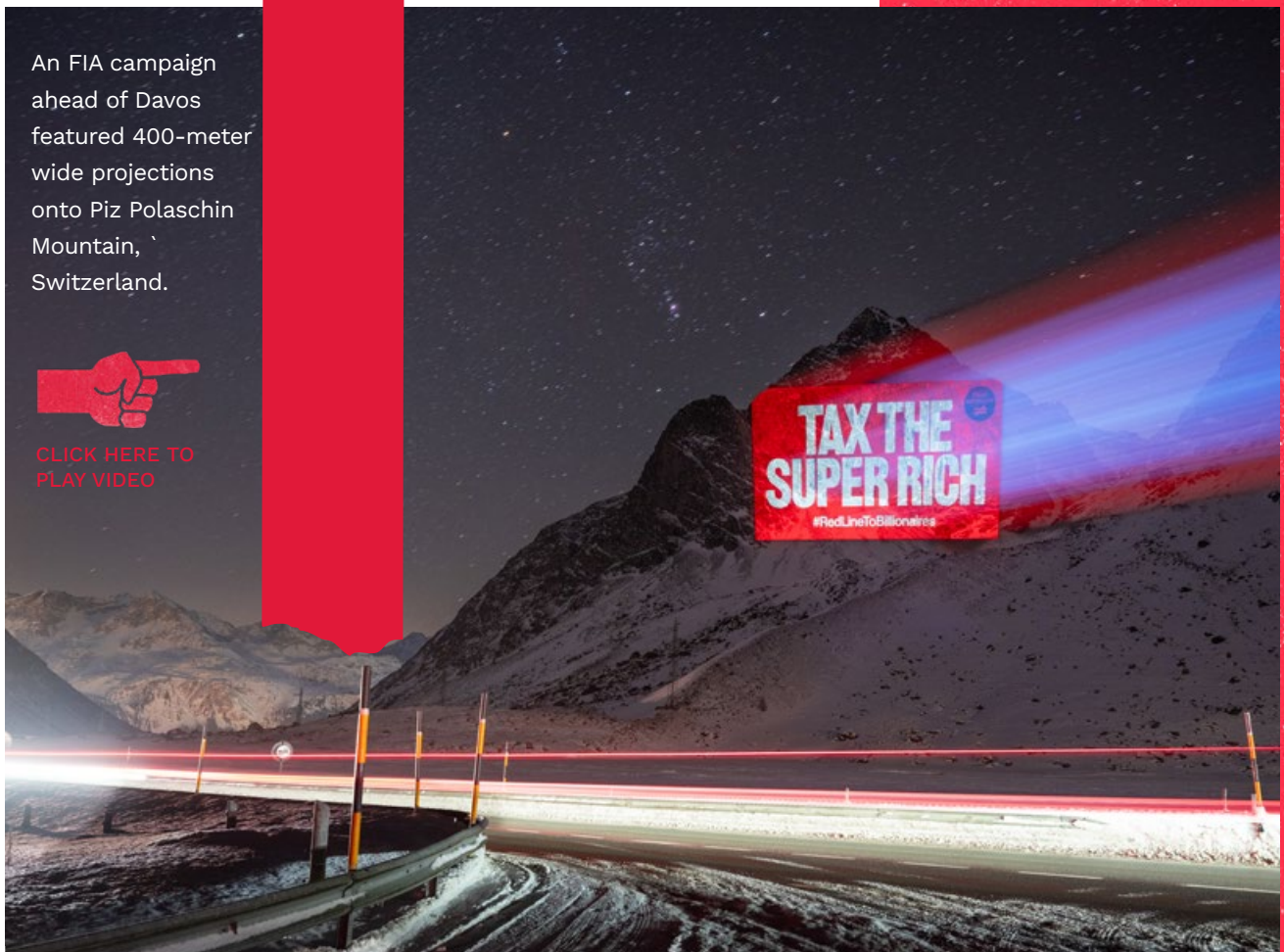

Movement building

HOW WE BUILD THE MOVEMENT

As the movement scales, FIA strengthens its internal systems to support greater complexity while maintaining grassroots accountability. With alliances active in 13 countries and rapidly growing membership, the focus has been on building durable infrastructure to sustain long-term movement growth.

LARGE-SCALE INFRASTRUCTURE:

FIA is expanding its footprint and building mobilising infrastructure across Africa, Asia and Latin America to use key world moments to demand a new global financial architecture from world leaders.



INTERNAL EVOLUTION:

FIA is driving constant growth - of the movement, its infrastructure and organising capacity. In 2025, Global South members came together at our largest ever Global Assembly, to co-create an inclusive, locally-led 2-year roadmap for the movement. The Assembly served as our strategic engine room, codifying a political architecture where national struggles from 20+ countries were the primary architects.



REGIONAL SUPPORT STRENGTHENS NATIONAL IMPACT:

Coordinated regional support improved cohesion and accountability. Membership surges (Mexico +100%, Indonesia nearing 300 members) confirmed that sustained engagement drives legitimacy.



PARTNERSHIPS AS A POWER MULTIPLIER:

The Summit confirmed FIA as an effective catalyst for a broader front. By co-raising funds and co-designing with international partners, we scaled our Theory of Change without losing our grassroots soul. The We The 99% – a People’s Summit for Global Economic Justice – Declaration is our basis for sustained mass mobilisation through 2028.



INVEST IN POLITICAL EDUCATION AND GRASSROOTS LEADERSHIP:

FIA places political education at the centre of building that movement. In 2025 over 750 organisers and 2,000 youth leaders strengthened activists’ political analysis, organising capacity, mobilising skills and leadership ability. This builds a movement that is more strategic, coordinated and capable of advancing the demands of the 99%. Political education programmes are being expanded.

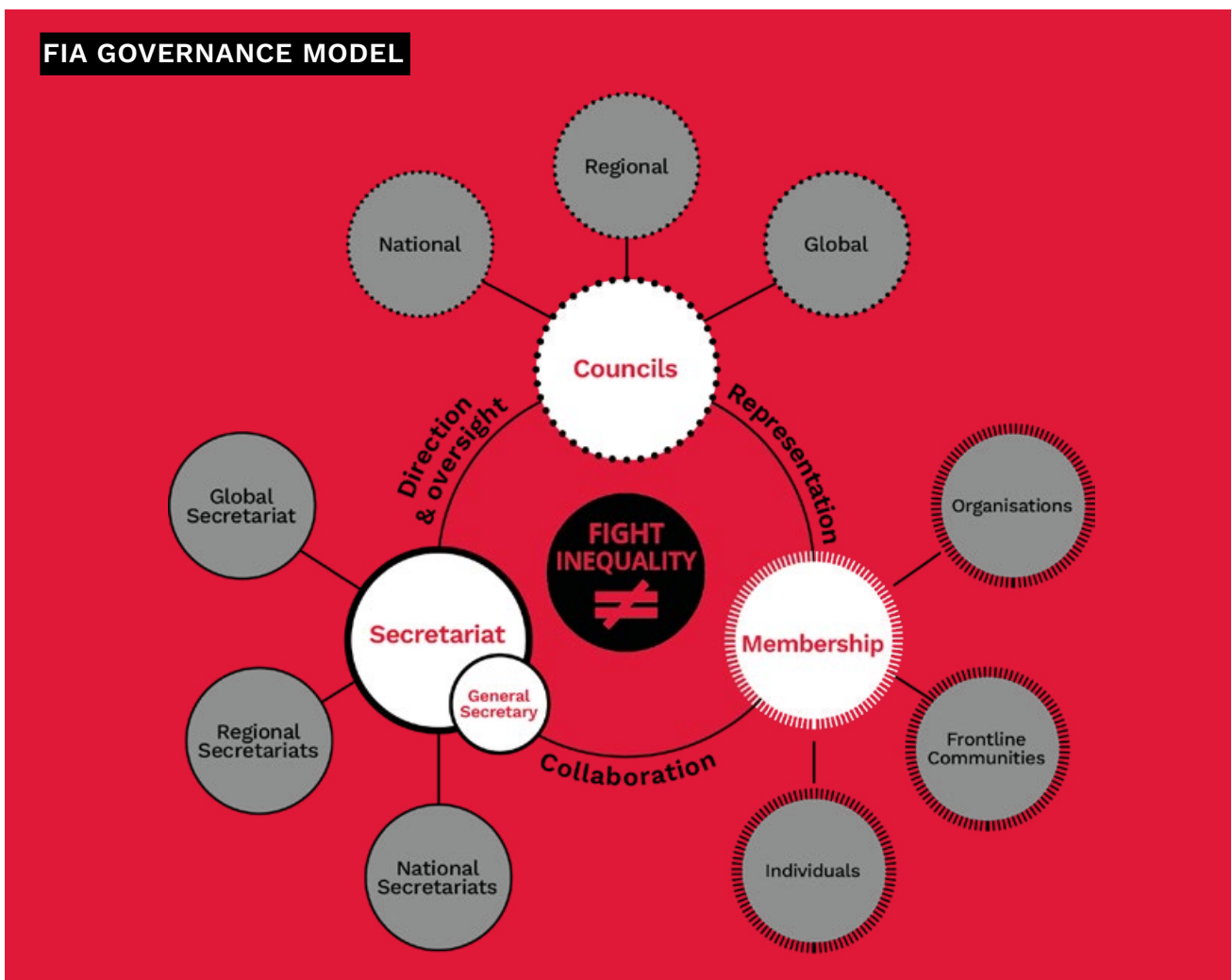
FIA has a clear governance structure, with our Global Council meeting regularly, national councils in Eswatini, India, Indonesia, Kenya, Mexico, Nigeria, Nepal, Pakistan, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Burkina Faso and Ivory Coast, and a regional council in Asia - more under formation.

Our focus on ensuring the growing Alliance is well governed has meant an evolution and strengthening of our secretariats and councils. The Global Council, created in 2024 and made up of our members, held its first meeting in 2025's first quarter. The Council is the primary platform for discussions and decision-making on policy, political positioning and strategy.

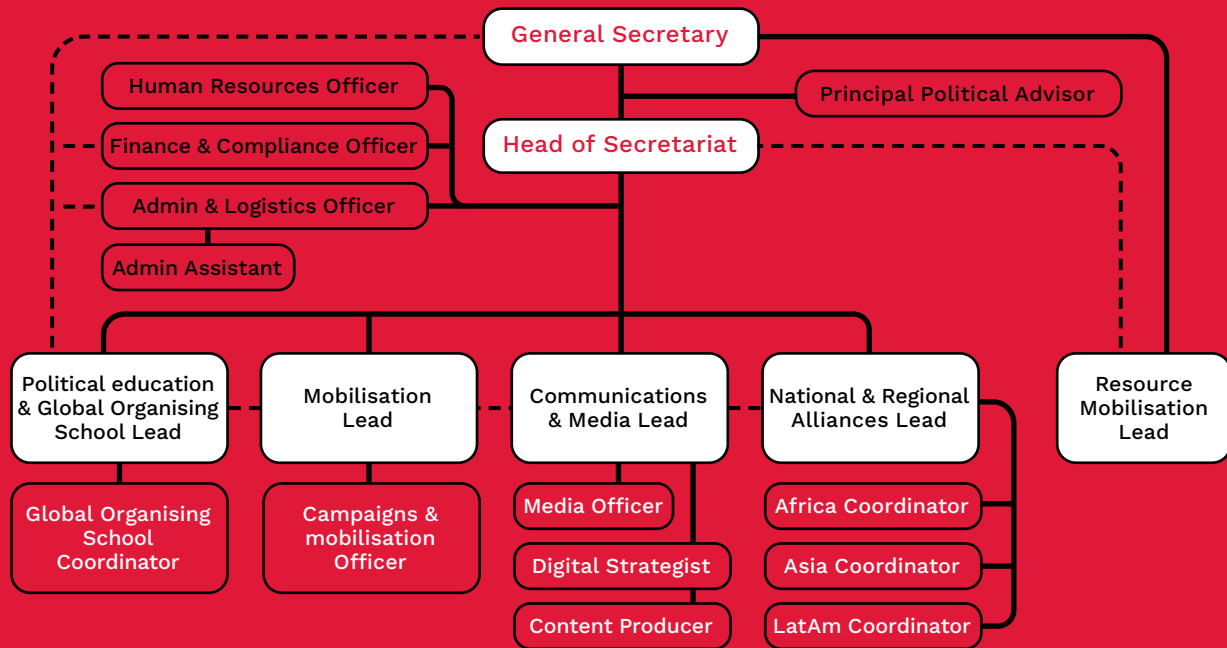
With the growth in scale and impact envisaged for the coming decade and beyond, we almost completed the process to register a global legal entity, with the right emphasis on enabling movement growth, stability and accountability of governance, funding, operations and financial management.

We are locally-led; people on the frontlines of inequality across the Global South set the priorities that drive our strategy. The Alliance's Global Secretariat synthesises priorities and has a mandate to coordinate global level actions and support regional and national alliances. National and regional alliances coordinators organise and motivate collective work in these locations with their membership.

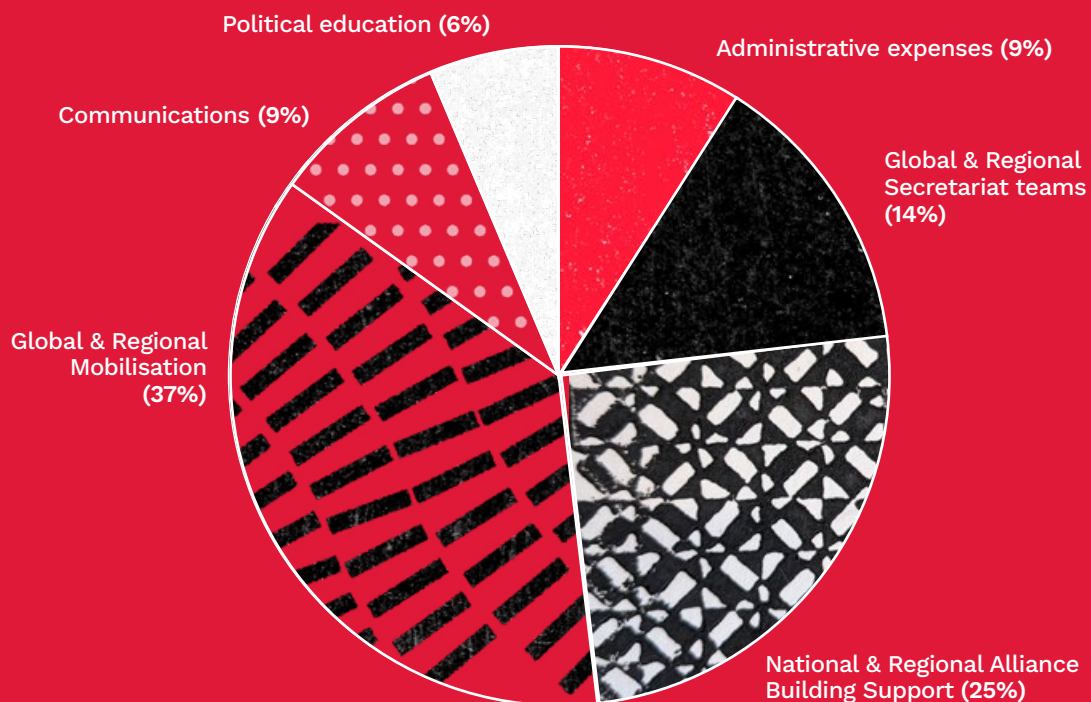
